

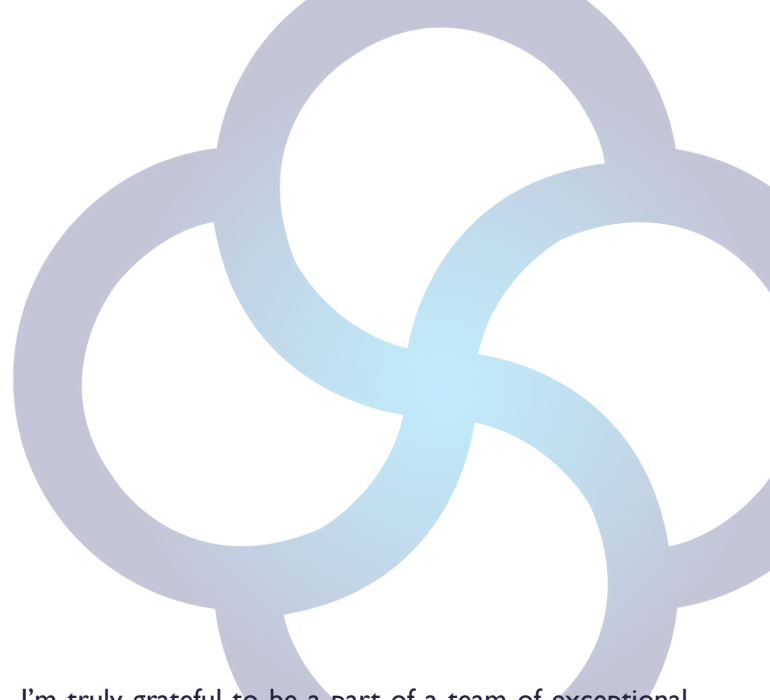

Amanda Quiroz became the first player to represent the Dominguez High School tennis team in postseason league playoffs.



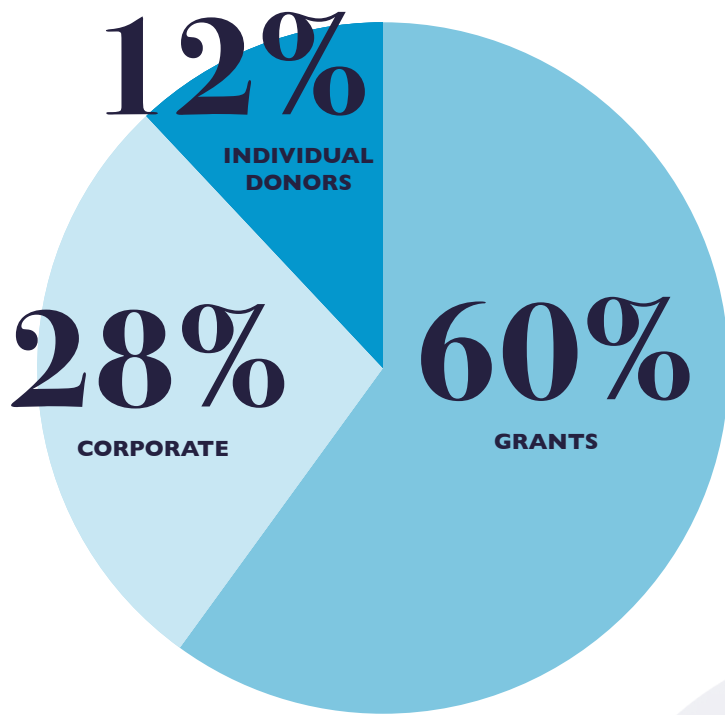
CELEBRATED 2 HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATIONS

Love, Love Compton continued its 100% highschool graduation rate with the graduation of Steffany Hernandez and Amanda Quiroz.

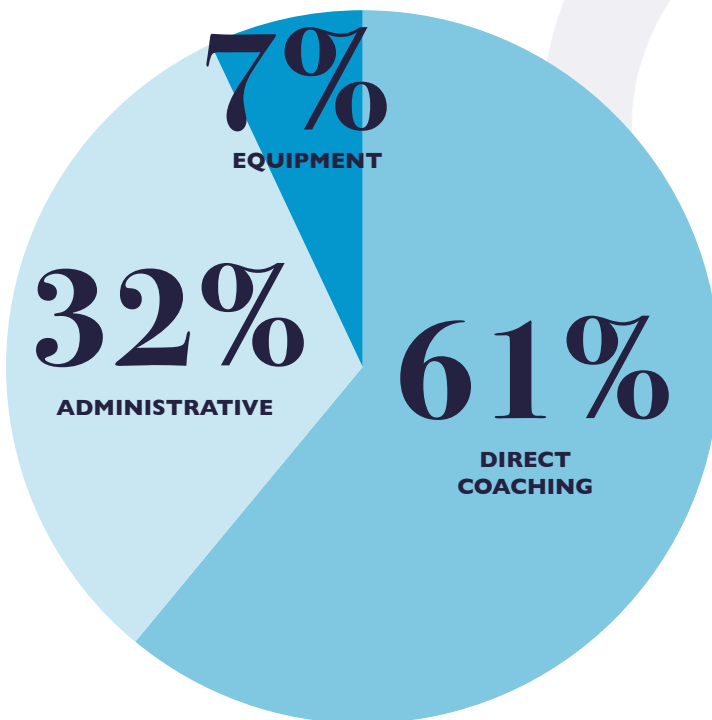
